Preparing your child for school



- Dress and undress themselves? Very important for P.E.
- Put on and fasten their own coat?
- Use the toilet independently and ask to go there?
- Tidy up after himself/herself? Share toys and resources?
- Feed himself/herself?


















Preparing your child for school

How can you help school.... to help your child?

Pupil Premium

Do you have a low income? Is your child entitled to the Pupil Premium?

If you are entitled, you're child receives the 'Pupil Premium':

- You get over £3000 worth of free school dinners over the 7 years your child will be at school
- School gets extra funding to support your child and others.

For your child:

- We may be able to part fund some trips and residentials
- We may be able to provide free music lessons
- We may be able to support you in other ways
- We may be able to support you with subsidised child care

Other pupils, parents and many staff members don't know who receives the pupil premium.

How to apply?

Qualifying benefits

The pupil premium is available to pupils in receipt of, or whose parents are in receipt of, one or more of the qualifying benefits:

•Universal Credit (provided you have an annual net earned income of no more than

 \pounds 7,400, as assessed by earning from up to three of your most recent assessment periods)

Income Support

•Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance (JSA)

Income-related Employment and Support Allowance (ESA)

•Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999

•The guarantee element of Pension Credit


•Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual gross income of no more

than £16,190

•Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after the person stops qualifying for Working Tax Credit)

<u>Reception is where the excitement begins!</u>

In the foundation stage children learn together in an environment which is developed around the children's interests. We pride ourselves on being an exciting and engaging place to be - encouraging our children to be independent learners through a range of practical activities. We follow a thematic curriculum which allows us to be creative with our lessons and let the children lead their own learning. Throughout the year we work with your child to develop the skills and attitudes needed in order to become effective learners... We call these the Characteristics of effective learning:

Creating and Thinking Critically – Thinking



At the end of a child's time in Reception they will be assessed in all of these areas.






Personal, Social and Emotional

A typical day in Reception...

- Morning activity & Register
- Sharing of weekly challenges
- Continuous provision
- Daily phonics sessions
- Snack time
- Maths sessions and games
- Weekly PE sessions
- Lunch time (we will support with this whilst the children are settling in)
- Focus activities
- Fine motor activities
- Topic or themed activities
- Lots and lots of story times and singing!



Phonics

- Some simple tips to help foster good phonic habits
- Try not to use capital letters as we bring those in once the children are confident with lowercase letters.
- It is best to use the sound of the letter rather than the name of the letter eg. The short 'a' for ant rather than long 'a' for Amy
- Try not to add an –uh sound after you say a letter. We call these 'pure sounds' see our website link below. Eg, say mmmm not m-uh.
 - Make Phonics fun!
 - Listen for things in the environment
 - Sing songs
 - Make silly noises and silly songs
 - I spy and word games
 - Follow your child's lead



Visit our Phonics page on our school website for lots of informative video's Eg. How to say pure sounds, What phrases do we use for each sound? What are special friends? How to start blending.

More information will be given at our yearly phonics meeting early in your child's first term. We will guide you through our RWI method (Read Write Inc).

Are you interested in how we teach your child to read, write and spell? Why don't you come along to a Phonics Evening, and we will show you the RWI method we use.

Learn about Fred the Frog! Speedy Sounds, Special friends Ditties and Special Reading Books. Find out how we use sound buttons and special friends to help the children learn how to blend sounds to make words.

What if my child needs a bit extra support?

Children With Additional Needs and Emotional Support Offer

- Keyworth Primary values each of its children as individuals and we work to ensure that all children, regardless of their specific needs, make the best possible progress in school, both academically and in terms of social and emotional development.
- Your child may join the school with you already having some concerns about aspects of their development or concerns may arise from you or school staff during their time in school. There is a wide range of special educational needs for which children may need extra support. Sometimes these needs are only short term, others may continue through a child's school life and some children may have a specific diagnosis. All children are treated as individuals and their needs are assessed on an individual basis.
- We are very proud of our holistic approach to the development of our children and, along with identifying concerns and then providing specific and targeted provision to support academic development, we also are acutely aware that children may, from time to time, require some emotional support. We have staff skilled with identifying these needs and then signposting to specific support or working within the setting to facilitate this. Alongside this, we are pleased that we have our Emotional Literacy Support Assistant working across the school with children; sometimes on an individual basis and sometimes in a group setting.
- Your child's teacher will communicate with you on a regular basis and you will also meet the school's SENCO, Mrs Holmes. The Foundation team and Mrs Holmes will work together to ensure that your child is giving the support he or she needs. You are also welcome to make an appointment with your child's teacher or Mrs Holmes at any time via contacting the school office.






Important information...



Fruit and milk is provided at school - no extra snacks are needed.




Drop your child off and collect them at the school door. If someone else is picking them up, let us know.




Please check your child's bag daily for notes and books. Books must go straight back in the bag.



Label all of your child's belongings – even shoes!










Other useful tips

- Talk to your child about school- explain what is going to happen and that you will be there to pick them up!

- Trips into the community






HOLIDAY CLUB
