
Seaside holidays past and present


Vocabulary	Definition
Punch and Judy	A puppet show about a man and his wife who argue.
Bathing machine	A small hut on wheels that gave Victorian people shelter to get changed and wheeled them to the water so they weren't seen in their swimwear.
Rockpool	A small area on a beach where water collects in pools. Some animals, like crabs live in these.
Lifeboat	A boat which is designed to travel out into seas in all weathers to rescue people in trouble.
Pollution	When chemicals cause damage and harm to an area.
Lighthouse	A tall house with a light at the top, which tells boats where land is and helps them see in the night.



RNLI stands for Royal National Lifeboat Institution. They rescue people who get in trouble at sea.

They also train lifeguards to keep people safe at the beach.
