RNLI stands for Royal National Lifeboat Institution. They rescue people who get in trouble at sea.	
They also train lifeguards to keep people safe at the beach.	

			
Grace Darling was the daughter of a light house keeper in England.	One night in 1838 she spotted a shipwreck in the stormy seas.	Her and her father rowed out into the dangerous sea to rescue the survivors.	They looked after the survivors at the lighthouse for 3 days until the storm passed.
