Year 3 Visit to Creswell Craggs

Year 3 visited Creswell Crags, one of the UK's most important prehistoric sites. The limestone gorge contains caves once home to Neanderthals and early modern humans during the Last Ice Age (60,000–10,000 years ago). Arriving on a misty morning made it feel as though we had stepped back in time.

We explored a real Palaeolithic cave overlooking the gorge lake and learnt how early humans survived harsh Ice Age conditions among animals such as reindeer, woolly rhinoceros, mammoth and wild horse. Creswell Crags is also home to the northernmost Ice Age cave art in Europe, including over 80 engravings in Church Hole Cave, some around 12,000 years old.

The children crawled through dark cave passages with torches, discovering how Stone Age people relied on fire, teamwork and careful listening to stay safe. After lunch, they built shelters like those used by hunter-gatherers and practised spear-throwing at a model bison, inspired by tools found in the caves.

We ended the day by examining prehistoric remains, including Ice Age animal skeletons and a mammoth tooth. The children's knowledge, curiosity and excellent behaviour made it a fantastic visit.



Art Week Exhibition!

Thank you to everyone who was able to join us for our very first KPNS Art Exhibition. This year, we were inspired by Henri Rousseau's painting *Surprised*. During Art Week, each child created their own individual piece of artwork, which was proudly displayed on Wednesday.

A visit from PC Carlisle

On Wednesday, children in Key Stage 2 took part in an assembly delivered by PC Carlisle. The session focused on staying safe and making positive choices, particularly in relation to how our actions and reactions affect others. She spoke in detail about the impact and consequences of bullying, both in person and online. The children were engaged throughout the assembly and asked a number of thoughtful questions.

World Book Day- Thursday 5th of March.

Quite soon after half term, we will be celebrating **World Book Day**. This year, our theme will be **“Non-fiction”**, and children are invited to dress up inspired by their favourite non-fiction book or a significant real-life person. Safer Internet Day Assembly

This week, children took part in our **Safer Internet Day** assembly. This year's focus for Safer Internet Day was **artificial intelligence (AI)** — what it is, how it is used, and how children can use technology safely, responsibly and kindly. We talked about:

- what AI means and where children might already see it
- how AI can be helpful, but also get things wrong
- the importance of kindness and checking information
- telling a trusted adult if something online causes worry or upset

We will also be sharing the slides used in the assembly so you can look through them together at home.

Questions you might ask your child (with helpful answers):

- *What does AI stand for?* Artificial intelligence — computers designed to do **some** things that human brains can do.
- *Can AI think or feel like people?* No. AI can spot patterns and give answers, but it doesn't have feelings, emotions or imagination.
- *Can AI ever be wrong?* Yes. AI can make mistakes, so it's important to check information and ask an adult if unsure.
- *Can AI ever be harmful or used in a bad way?* Sometimes, yes. AI can be used unkindly (for example, to make upsetting messages or images), or it can give wrong or confusing information. That's why we should always use it carefully and tell a trusted adult if something doesn't feel right.
- *When is AI a good choice to use?* When it helps learning, communication or creativity **without** being unkind, unsafe or unfair.
- *What should you do if something online worries you?* Tell a trusted adult — at home or at school — straight away.

These short conversations really help children make sense of what they hear and build good habits around technology. Thank you for continuing to work with us to keep children safe, thoughtful and confident online.
